Our gratitude we send to those too important to be missed: Our loyal supporters -- that means *you* -- without whom we'd not exist



Hi, all! I'm Zeke, a 3-5 year old mixed breed who enjoys walks, back rubs, and quiet time with my special person (or people). I'm a big guy at 73 lbs, but I'm calm as the day is long. I'm perfectly housetrained and don't even need my crate anymore because I never chew anything that isn't mine for chewin'. To encourage you to take me for walks, I promise I'll stay right by your side and never pull on my leash — not even

if I see a squirrel or bunny (though I will stop and point at it!). I really prefer the peace and quiet of an adult home. Too much activity can make me a bit nervous, and little kids seem to move too fast and unpredictably for a couch potato like me. You really should come and meet me. If you scratch my back and talk nicely to me, I'll give the you the most loving over-the-shoulder smile you've ever seen!



With summer temperatures soaring, be sure your best friend stays safe and cool

- **☼** Schedule a spring or early summer check-up at the vet, and include a test for heartworm, if your dog isn't on year-round preventive medication. Also, ask the doctor to recommend a safe, effective flea and tick control program.
- Wever leave your pet alone in a vehicle. Even with the windows open, temperatures inside a parked automobile can quickly become dangerously high. Shade offers little protection, because the sun shifts.
- ****** Carry a thermos filled with cold, fresh water when traveling with your pet.
- **Schedule outdoor playtime in the early morning or evening** when it's cooler, but never after a meal or when the weather is humid.
- ☼ Don't leave your dog standing on hot asphalt. The body can heat up quickly, and sensitive paw pads can burn. Keep walks during these times to a minimum.
- ****** Avoid beaches unless you can guarantee a shaded spot and plenty of fresh water for your pet.
- **** Keep your pet inside** in a cool part of

- the house during the heat of the day.
- w Be mindful of special breeds and special needs. Brachycephalic or snubnosed dogs (like bulldogs, pugs, Boston terriers, Lhasa apsos and shih tzus) and those with heart or lung diseases should stay in air-conditioned rooms as much as possible. Older and overweight animals also are especially sensitive to heat.
- ** Avoid toxins on the street. Steer your dog clear of areas that have been sprayed with insecticides or other chemicals, and avoid coolant spills or other automotive fluids that may have leaked from vehicles. If you suspect that your animal has been exposed, call your veterinarian or the ASPCA Animal Poison Control Center (888- 426-4435) immediately.
- * Help prevent summer skin problems with good grooming, especially for dogs with heavy coats. A good haircut helps prevent overheating. Shave the hair to a one-inch length (not down to the skin; doing so removes your dog's protection from the sun). Brush cats often to maintain healthy skin and coat.

- W Only use sunscreen and insect repellents labeled specifically for use on animals. Ingestion of human sunscreens can result in drooling, diarrhea, excessive thirst, and lethargy. The misuse of insect repellent that contains DEET can lead to neurological problems.
- Don't leave unscreened windows or doors in your home open. Your pets could jump out or fall.

Dear Adopt-A-Pet: I cannot say enough about JD since he became a member of our family. He seems to be the happiest when he is pleasing me. We have been inseparable since I brought him home; I even take him to work with me. He cannot get enough of car rides — he



loves them, probably because ice cream is usually part of our trips. He had a distrust of other dogs, but I slowly introduced him around and now he can't wait to go visiting at our friend's homes. I know he cannot wait until he is all cleared [from heartworm treatment) to fully play again. He is wonderful with all children, he knows the difference between a teen and a baby, and he is so gentle with the small ones. I have neighborhood

cats that congregate on my deck, and he is so gentle with them. I have a habit of bringing them in and feeding them, taking them to a vet and getting them neutered, and JD likes to "take care" of them. His training is coming along very well and he thrives when we are spending time "playing" games. He is going to start Advanced Obedience in August.

I have not once gotten upset with him until last night, when he [decided] he was going to act crazy at midnight. JD started whining, which is something he only does when he has to go out, and I know we had just went for our evening walk at 11:00 pm. He pawed me, which is something he never does and he started barking at the door; then I knew something was wrong, because he never barks unless someone he hasn't met comes into the yard. So I got up and opened the door with leash in hand and was overwhelmed with smoke. The house next door was on fire and then I heard the sirens. JD was warning me; needless to say I spent the rest of the night showing him just how much I appreciate him. This was the second time he had stepped up to protect me. Last week we were on one of our walks and a neighbor's [dog] got loose and was at my face in 20 seconds flat. JD jumped in front of me and stopped the dog from attacking me, the dog backed down, and JD stood him off until his owner got there.

For those that are considering adoption, please look toward the older dogs. They have so much to give and are so grateful. Please don't judge by first impression. JD was pretty rambunctious, but I spent time during our first visit to really see him. Remember these animals are coming from mostly horrible starts in life, caged up from shelter to rescue, and if they need medical the lock-up time could be longer. You need to take the time to gain their trust and faith in humans again. Trust me it is well worth the time and effort. They give back twofold what you give them. In the 6 weeks that I have had JD, he
